Welcome also to Amanda Razon who has joined the team! Amanda is looking forward to meeting you either in person or via email—and possibly via some video connection in time!

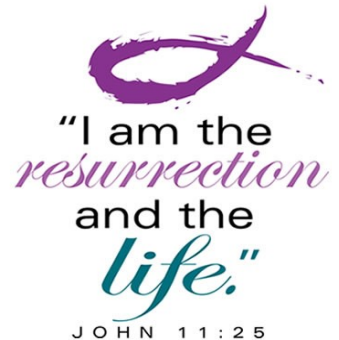

I also have been led down a windy road of doing part time positions of being an Early Childhood Educator, Chaplain and Youth Minister over the past several years. During my time, the interactions and relationships that I have made with people across all walks of life has shaped my motivation to be doing the work that I am doing now. I look forward to the year ahead and meeting many of you soon!



EASTER—Christ, the Light of the World

Easter is not just a single day of celebration—it's an entire season where we celebrate our new life in Christ. Easter is celebrated for an extended period of time—50 days to be exact—up until we celebrate the great feast of Pentecost!

The beautiful dramatic Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night marks the beginning of Easter. On this night, we await the Master's return with *lamps lit* and ready to share at the same table at the rising of the sun. It is reminiscent of the adult baptisms of the Early Church when the Word of God was proclaimed throughout the night and God's goodness in salvation history was recalled. During this time, the adults who had been rigorously preparing over a few years to live as a Christian were baptised, confirmed and now able to enter and receive communion at the *table of the Lord*. They were, at this point, fully initiated into the Christian community. This ceremony will take all night. All involved would celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus—the Light of the World - with the morning's rising sun!

Each year, our parishes celebrate the Easter Vigil which is divided into four parts:

1 Service of Light

Here, the church is in darkness, a fire is lit, the paschal candle is enthroned, the *Exultet*—the song proclaiming the Light of Christ coming into the world is sung, the whole church is lit and the people respond with a grateful 'Thanks be to God'!

2 Liturgy of the Word

With grateful hearts, we listen to God's goodness to his people through the readings. This is our story where the God of love comes to us in good and in difficult times. There are nine readings in the full version:

- i. Story of Creation, Gen 1:1-2; 2;
- ii. Abraham and Isaac, Gen 22:1-18;

- iii. Crossing of the Red Sea, Exodus 14:15–15:1;
- iv. Isaiah 54:5-14;
- v. Isaiah 55:1-11;
- vi. Baruch 3:9-15.32–4:4;
- vii. Ezekiel 36:16-17.18-28;
- viii. Romans 6:3-11; and
- ix. Gospel reading Mark 16:1-7

3 Liturgy of Baptism

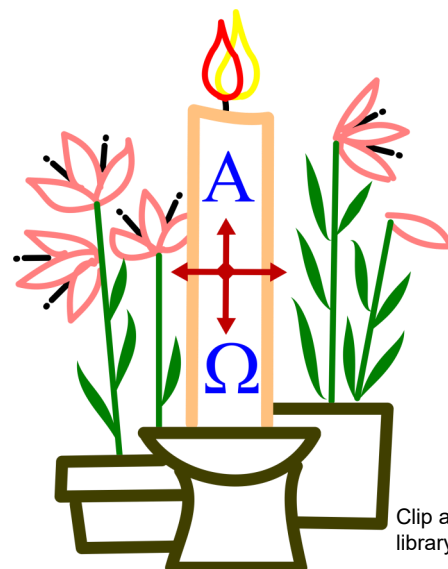
During this time the Easter water is blessed, new members are baptised, others *received* into the Church who have been baptised in other Christian Churches and the Litany of the Saints is prayed. All in the Church are then blessed with water and all renew the promises made at their baptism.

4 Liturgy of the Eucharist

At this point, Mass resumes for all. Everyone who has been baptised or *received* into the Catholic church share at the table of the Lord and receive communion for the first time in this community. They are all now fully initiated members and share in the life of the faith community.

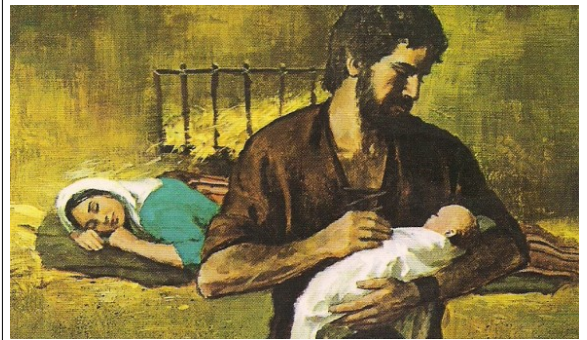

YEAR OF ST JOSEPH

Pope Francis published an Apostolic Letter *Patris corde* (*With a Father's Heart*), commemorating the 150th anniversary of the declaration of Saint Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church.

To mark the occasion, Pope Francis has proclaimed a "Year of St Joseph" running from December 8, 2020 to December 8, 2021. The theme for the year is "Show yourself a father, and guide us in the path of life'.

I wonder...who is Joseph in the scriptures?

(Extract from *With a Father's Heart*)

'Matthew and Luke, the two Evangelists who speak most of Joseph, tell us very little, yet enough for us to appreciate what sort of father he was, and the mission entrusted to him by God's providence'.

'In the Temple, forty days after Jesus' birth, Joseph and Mary offered their child to the Lord and listened with amazement to Simeon's prophecy concerning Jesus and his Mother (cf. *Lk* 2:22-35). To protect Jesus from Herod, Joseph dwelt as a foreigner in Egypt (cf. *Mt* 2:13-18). After returning to his own country, he led a hidden life in the tiny and obscure village of Nazareth in Galilee, far from Bethlehem, his ancestral town, and from Jerusalem and the Temple. Of Nazareth it was said, "No prophet is to rise" (cf. *Jn* 7:52) and indeed, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" (cf. *Jn* 1:46). When, during a pilgrimage to Jerusalem, Joseph and Mary lost track of the twelve-year-old Jesus, they anxiously sought him out and they found him in the Temple, in discussion with the doctors of the Law (cf. *Lk* 2:41-50)'.

I wonder...who is Joseph for you?

In his letter, Pope Francis describes Joseph as:

A father who is tender and loving, obedient, accepting and creatively courageous. He also describes him as a worker and as a person in the shadows. Pope Francis tells us that 'Joseph found happiness not in mere self-sacrifice but in self-gift'.

I wonder who Joseph is for each of us?

I wonder how we can live these qualities as parents and as catechists?

WITH A FATHER'S HEART

is how Joseph loved Jesus, whom all four Gospels refer to as "the son of Joseph" (*Lk* 4:22; *Jn* 6:42; cf. *Mt* 13:55; *Mk* 6:3)

FAMILY IDEAS

PRAYER AND REFLECTION

- ◇ Start a prayer journal using an exercise book or note book and cover and/or decorate
- ◇ Write your own prayers to God
- ◇ Ask Jesus to be with you as you prepare to receive him in your hearts through the Sacraments.
- ◇ Learn and pray prayers with your family such as the Our Father, Hail Mary, Glory Be, a Sorry prayer asking for forgiveness, the Apostles' Creed, Come Holy Spirit. Use these in your prayers during the week.



- ◇ Explore your favourite Morning and Night prayer.
- ◇ Search google for other prayers you may like.
- ◇ Learn the prayers from the Mass: Gloria, Holy Holy, Lamb of God
- ◇ Search you tube for songs by Michael Mangan, Andrew Chinn and John Burland. Use these as part of your prayer or enjoyment as a family.
- ◇ Discuss with your family about what you are looking forward to in receiving the Sacraments. Write a prayer to Jesus about this and ask him each day to help you.

- ◇ Thank God for the blessings of the day.
Ask Jesus to show you what were the good or poor choices you made that day at school or home.
Reflect on your thoughts or actions during the day - the actions you took or the actions for good that you didn't take.
Reflect on what you could do to make up for the poor choices or what actions you can take the next time.
Write to Jesus about thanking him for his help during the day and asking him to help you to do better and grow close to him.

GOSPEL STORIES

- ◇ Search youtube for gospel stories such as Zacchaeus, the Good Samaritan, the Good Shepherd or the Lost Sheep, the Prodigal Son, the First Eucharist or the Last Supper, Pentecost or the Coming of the Holy Spirit.
Share and discuss with your family.
Then, write a prayer or a reflection on the message of Jesus' story for your life at home or at school.
- ◇ Search for activity sheets on the Gospel stories.

INSPIRING PEOPLE

- ◇ Reflect on people you know among your family, friends or school and write why they inspire you
- ◇ Write about or draw the wonderful gifts God has given to you
- ◇ Using google or books from your school library or the Resource Centre at Thebarton, explore Saints who may inspire you and write why in your prayer journal.
- ◇ Search youtube for video clips on the *Gifts of the Holy Spirit* and reflect which gift you would like the most in your life and why. Write your reflection in your prayer journal.
- ◇ Search youtube for clip on the *Fruits of the Holy Spirit* and write in your journal who you know who show these gifts in their lives. Discuss with your family what fruits of the spirit you see in your own

These are a few ideas to nurture the faith life of children and their families.

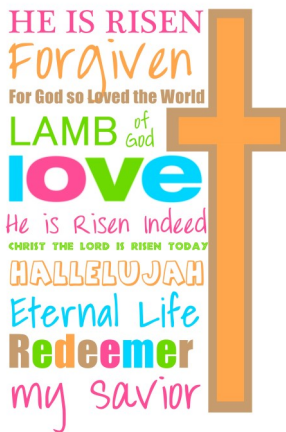


Symbol of Easter?

The rabbit or bunny is used in our society as a symbol of Easter and brings a lot of delight to children. In the northern hemisphere, Easter is during spring when there is new life aplenty and this represents the new life that Jesus brings to us through his resurrection.

To make use of this symbol to help children understand the meaning of Easter, you may like to include a note from the Easter bunny referring to Jesus' Resurrection as the reason for celebrating Easter. The egg is another symbol of new life that you may like to discuss with your children.

Look around in your garden and neighbourhood for other things that are springing to new life at this time. Discuss some ideas with your children about what can bring 'new life' to your family this season. Is it through the way we care for each other through our words and actions? Is it through the way we can come together as a family to pray and ask Jesus to be with you each day? Let us take some time to explore!



A MESSAGE OF JOY TO FAMILIES BY POPE FRANCIS

Dear families, you know very well that the true joy which we experience in the family is does not come from material objects, from the fact that everything seems to be going well... True joy comes from a profound harmony between persons, something which we all feel in our hearts and which makes us experience the beauty of togetherness, of mutual support along life's journey. **But the basis of this feeling of deep joy is the presence of God, the presence of God in the family and his love, which is welcoming, merciful, and respectful towards all. And above all, a love which is patient: patience is a virtue of God and he teaches us how to cultivate it in family life, how to be patient, and lovingly so, with each other. The family is the salt of the earth and the light of the world, it is the leaven of society as a whole.**

YEAR OF THE FAMILY

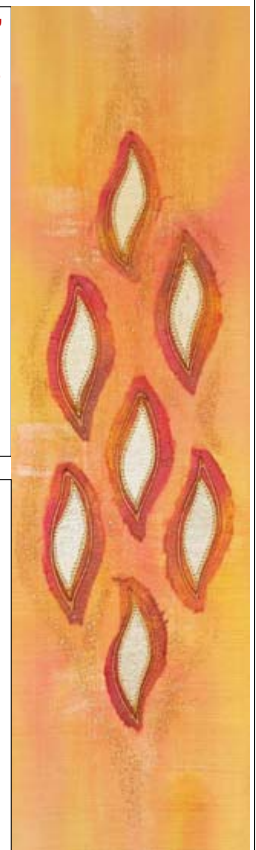
Pope Francis has announced a special *Year of the Family*

The Faith Formation Team is located within the structure of Catholic Education, South Australia. The team consists of Sr Jenny Seal fdnsc and Amanda Razon who are both part time in the office.

For those who are new to children's ministries, this office supports those engaged in the catechesis of children and their families within the parishes of the Adelaide Archdiocese. We provide resources, consultation, workshops and ongoing formation that support parish and school communities in the main areas of Family Catechesis, Sacraments of Initiation of children of catechetical age, Liturgy of the Word with Children and Religious Education and catechesis of children who attend a non-Catholic school. The team promotes the partnerships between family, parish and school. This year, we are looking at ways to integrate parent formation.

Please know that the team are here to support you in the best way forward for yourself, your ministry with the children and your parish community.

Catechist Newsletters and Communications

There will be four Catechist newsletters this year called *Making Connections*. We hope that this will assist you with some formational and news items as well as resources available.

We are also hoping that we may be able to make available to you an online communication more occasionally to bring news of events or ideas that may be useful. We also communicate with parishes via the Archdiocesan e-news as needed and schools via the Religious Education Communique.

Catechist Formation, Training and Workshops

Due to the restrictions of COVID-19 in 2020, face-to-face training and workshops for Catechists was unavailable. This year, 2021, we are hoping that catechists will avail themselves of getting together and building their community of support. Below are our workshop offerings to date:

A Catechist Enrichment Workshop for all catechists and for anyone interested in being involved in children's ministries. In particular, all new catechists are encouraged to attend. Liturgy of the Word with Children during Term 3. Please keep this in mind for all who haven't completed this 3 hour training. This may also be an occasion for new recruits or interest in this ministry. This training is important for those leading as it delineates the correct process for this **Liturgy** with children at the same time of the Liturgy of the Word during a Sunday Mass. This time is meant to be a prayerful, reflective time for the children on the gospel with appropriate prayers and responses. This process can also be utilised with children in other settings and is an opportunity for liturgical catechesis.

A reminder to all catechists, parishes and groups within the Archdiocese to be aware of and to revisit the policies, procedures and resources provided by the Catholic Archdiocese of Adelaide Child Protection Unit <https://adelaide.catholic.org.au/our-people/child-protection-unit> in relation to any Children's Ministries or events.

If you are involved in any children ministries or events with children, please make sure that:

- you have completed the training through your parish or school
- your parish has completed the *Risk Assessment* for the children's ministry that you are involved in or any event that your group organises with children. The Risk Assessment can be found at: <https://adelaide.catholic.org.au/files/f/45760/Risk%20Assessment%20Checklist%20Tool.pdf>

This would include all children ministries such as Sacramental Catechesis, Liturgy of the Word with Children, Religious Education and Formation of children and any other events held with children. Please be aware that it is important for adults working with children to work in pairs of adults or in clear view of another responsible adult.

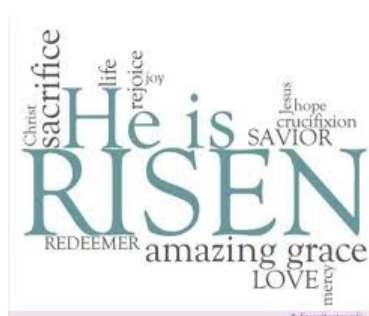

Spend some time in a quiet prayer response, reflecting and/or journaling

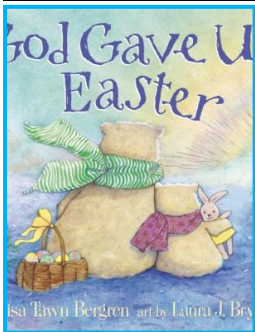
