Marian Procession & Peace Rally 2021

At 1.30pm, Sunday May 16, 2021, more than 800 people gathered at the Jubilee Hall of the Adelaide Showgrounds, at Wayville for the 72th Annual Marian Procession of the Archdiocese of Adelaide. This indoor venue was perfect for this Diocesan Event which brings people from parishes, communities and schools together as one people of the Catholic faith to honour Mary, Mother of the Church, in the month of May when the weather is often unpredictable.

The atmosphere was spacious, prayerful and welcoming, as the people assembled to process around the hall while praying the Sorrowful Mystery of the Rosary with the Readings and many hymns to Mary sung beautifully by the choir. The Rosary, recited in five different languages (English, Bari, Hungarian, Tetum, and Spanish), recognised the diversity of our Catholic Church. At the procession the participants marched behind their banners, each with their own Icon/Picture of Mary, with people dressed in traditional costumes celebrating the diversity of our multicultural church.

St Thomas Feast Celebration 2021

On the 2nd July, 2021 at 7pm, Father Philip Marshall and 12 concelebrating priests and four deacons, celebrated The Feast of St Thomas the Apostle, a very important Multicultural Mass for the Adelaide Archdiocese and the Indian Community of Adelaide.

This feast is significant as it commemorates the arrival of the Christian faith in India. Accordingly, many different language groups, from across India, came together purely to give thanks and praise to God for bringing the eternal truth of Jesus Christ to His people, through Saint Thomas the Apostle, who journeyed to India in the early days of the church.

The Mass was live-streamed from St Francis Xavier Cathedral, with the Church at full capacity, keeping in line with new government restrictions released two days earlier.

The celebration started with a beautiful ceremony of "Maha Aarathi". Three girls, dressed in Indian traditional costume, performed a prayful, cultural liturgical dance in front of the altar. Promoting the relevance of faith and culture complimenting each other in our multicultural celebrations.

The Filipino Santacruzán & Launching of 500th Anniversary of Philippines Christianisation

On Saturday the 29th May the Filipino Catholic Community came together to celebrate both 500 YEARS OF CHRISTIANITY IN THE PHILIPPINES combined with their annual celebration of SANTA CRUZAN.

Approximately 2000 people participated in this combined celebration, with traditional food stalls, music, dancing, good cheer and the beauty pageant!

The Scalabrinian Priests: Fathers Franco & Roger and Father Harold (Filipino Priest from the Diocese of Port Piere) celebrated the Holy Mass at 2pm in a temporary built marquee at the parking space of Mater Christi Church.

The Mass was celebrated in different languages and dialects that serve as a medium of communication of the liturgy since the arrival of the Catholic missionaries from Spain and Portugal. The Mass attendees wore different national and native costumes from the different eras and times. Mass songs were also sung in different dialects of the Archipelago.

2021 is a significant year in the faith lives of Filipino Catholics throughout the world.



40th Anniversary of the Chinese Catholic Community



On 7th March 2021, His Grace, Archbishop Patrick O'Regan celebrated Mass at St. Joseph's Church, Tranmere, on the occasion of the 40th year of the foundation of the Chinese Catholic Community of South Australia.

The Mass was celebrated bilingually in English and Chinese. The children took part in the Readings and singing. These activities fostered an enthusiastic participation in the Mass. Father Matthew Qin concelebrated the Mass with the Archbishop. Father Qin came from China in 2010 to train as a novice at St. Paul Monastery and has returned to help in the formation program of other passionist novices who have come from China, Vietnam, Papua New Guinea and elsewhere. Father Roderick O'Brien joined the congregation after saying Mass at his own regular parish. Sister Nien Tran, Manager of the Archdiocesan Multicultural Office, was also present.

After Mass the congregation had a celebratory "shared lunch" under Covid19 regulations. There was a good variety of food which had been provided by participants and the atmosphere was very joyful.

The Chinese Catholic Community came about in a "miraculous" way. In August 1980 a young man from Whyalla was ordained as a Catholic priest in Adelaide. Fr. Roderick O'Brien had previously worked as a solicitor in Hong Kong. He made many Chinese friends and he began to study Chinese Language and Culture. With the permission from the Church, the first Mass in Chinese was celebrated by Fr Roderick O'Brien on Christmas Eve in 1981, at the Otherway Centre, Pirie Street, Adelaide. Subsequently Masses were held during some Chinese festivals eg. Mid-Autumn Festival. A small committee was formed which consisted of Mrs. Philomena Koo, Phyllis Lim and the late Bernadette Li to coordinate activities.

Father Roderick worked tirelessly to be with the community, including driving three hours from Naracoorte. When required, he would arrange for other priests to help us. All the Archbishops have been very supportive of our community, including advice from Sr. Nien Tran, Manager of the Archdiocesan Multicultural Office. At various times, we had religious Sisters who acted as pastoral associates including Sr. Joan Yu from Hong Kong.

Currently Chinese Mass is celebrated on the first Sunday of each month at 12.30pm, at St. Joseph's Church, Tranmere Parish. A shared lunch was held after Mass until Covid 19 pandemic prevented that from happening. The Community is now blessed with many young families.

Grants of up to \$5,000 are available for festivals and events to be held between 1 January 2022 and 30 June 2022.





New Director of the Australian Catholic Migrant and Refugee Office

During the Plenary Meeting of the Bishops Conference held in November 2020, the Bishops were advised of the appointment of Fr Khalid Marogi as the next Director of the Australian Catholic Migrant and Refugee Office. Fr Marogi commenced his appointment on 3 May 2021.

Born and raised in Iraq, Fr Marogi was ordained to the priesthood in 1992. This was followed by two years compulsory national military service, two years in parish ministry and three years as Vice-Rector of Baghdad College, the Chaldean Minor Seminary.

Fr Marogi has spent years working with diverse communities, including time in the Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (APY) Lands working with Aboriginal ministry, and will no doubt make many important contributions to the work at ACMRO.


